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taking its departure point from the 1933 surrealist photographs of involuntary sculptures by brassa nd dal found sculpture and photography from surrealism to contemporary art offers fresh perspectives on the sculptural object by relating it to both surrealist concerns with chance and the crucial role of photography in framing the everyday this collection of essays questions the nature of sculptural practice looking to forms of production and reproduction that blur the boundaries between things that are made and things that are found one of the book s central themes is the interplay of

presence and absence in sculpture as it is highlighted disrupted or multiplied through photography's indexical nature the essays examine the surrealist three dimensional object its relation to and transformation through photographs as well as the enduring legacies of such concerns for the artwork's materiality and temporality in performance and conceptual practices from the 1960s through the present found sculpture and photography sheds new light on the shifts in status of the art object challenging the specificity of visual practices pursuing a radical interrogation of agency in modern and contemporary practices and exploring the boundaries between art and everyday life

david bate examines automatism and the photographic image the surrealist passion for insanity ambivalent use of orientalism use of sadomasochistic philosophy and the effect of fascism of the surrealists the book is illustrated with a wide range of surrealist photographs

the author analyses how the surrealists utilised the tactics of documentary and how surrealist ideas in turn influenced the development of documentary photography this is a study of what louis aragon called surrealist realism the exploration of the real life surreality of the city

lee miller 1907 1977 was an american born surrealist and war photographer who through her role as a model for vogue magazine became the apprentice of man ray in paris and later one of the few women war correspondents to cover the second world war from the frontline her comprehensive understanding of art enabled her to photograph vivid representations of europe at war the changing gender roles of women in war work the destruction caused by enemy fire during the london blitz and the horrors of the concentration camps that embraced and adapted the principles and methods of surrealism this book examines how miller's war photographs can be interpreted as surreal documentary combining a surrealist sensibility with a need to inform each chapter contains a close analysis of specific photographs in a generally chronological study with a thematic focus using comparisons with other photographers documentary artists and surrealists such as margaret bourke white dorothea lange walker evans george rodger cecil beaton bill brandt henry moore humphrey jennings and man ray in addition miller's photographs are explored through andré breton's theory of convulsive beauty his credence that any subject no matter how horrible may be interpreted as art and his notion of the marvellous

the first monograph to analyze the surrealist gesture of photographic appropriation this study examines found photographs in three french surrealist reviews published in the 1920s and 1930s *la r lution surr iste* edited by andr reton documents edited by georges bataille and minotaure edited by breton and others the book asks general questions about the production and deployment of meaning through photographs but addresses more specifically the construction of a surrealist practice of photography through the gesture of borrowing and re contextualization and reveals something crucial both about surrealist strategies and about the way photographs operate the book is structured around four case studies including scientific photographs of an hysteric in charcot s clinic at the salp i hospital positioned as poetry rather than pathology and one of the first crime scene photographs depicting jack the ripper s last victim radically transformed into a work of art linda steer traces the trajectory of the found photographs from their first location to their location in a surrealist periodical her study shows that the act of removal and re framing highlights the instability and mutability of photographic meaning an instability and mutability that has consequences for our understanding both of photography and of surrealism in the 1920s and 1930s

lee miller photography surrealism and beyond offers a major new critical discussion of the work of one of the most significant twentieth century photographers applying art theoretical analyses and insights afforded by previously unseen material in archives and collections patricia allmer undertakes revisionary readings of many of miller s works including portrait of space severed breast from radical mastectomy and the famous series of war photographs produced for vogue at the same time she sheds new light on miller s relations with surrealist groups and american avant gardes on her experiences in paris egypt and world war ii europe and on her critically neglected post war activities above all lee miller photography surrealism and beyond focuses critical attention on the works themselves as a result it will be of great interest to students and scholars of twentieth century photography modernism and surrealism

plot to a film this very continuity means that it is difficult to place them at one remove from us in history hopkins 2004 introduction defining surrealism has become as hopkins s statement illustrates a very challenging task due to its wide prevalence in contemporary speech and language which makes it difficult to isolate surrealism historically and to distinguish between its intended meanings within certain historical epochs as the following section will outline surrealism has been continuously influenced and shaped from generation to generation and has therefore been marked by different characteristics throughout history the long historical chronology of aspley 2010 xv of the surreal has indeed caused a lot of confusion with regard to the usage of the term which should always be contextualized within the respective examined epoch in order to grasp its intended spirit this research paper aims at examining and defining the early twentieth century surrealist movement more closely which has been described in the manifeste du surréalisme in 1924 by andré breton who seems to be widely acknowledged as the father of surrealism after a brief theoretical section outlining a short historical chronology of surrealism and commenting on breton s influence on the surrealist movement in 20th century france chapter 3 will present an analysis of nadja 1928 one of breton s most important surrealist novels forming the climax of the literary movement of surrealism in france reents 2009 31 the analysis will be carried out from a predominantly photographic angle to examine how photography relates to the concept of the surreal and how it helps define surrealism in breton s time

in his previous book *City Gorged with Dreams* 2002 Ian Walker challenged established ideas about surrealist photography by emphasizing the key role played by documentary photographs in Parisian surrealism. Now Walker turns his attention to the arrival of surrealism in England in 1936, examining for the first time the surprising relationship between surrealism and English documentary photography and film. The book shows that some of the most interesting work of the period was made in the ambiguous spaces between them.

Julien Levy 1906-1981 was one of the most influential proponents of photography and surrealism during the second quarter of the 20th century. This catalogue presents a survey of his collection and the essays illuminate Levy's role in promoting photography and surrealism.

This thesis examines the use of photographs in surrealist publications in Paris between 1924 and 1969, analysing how images functioned both in relation to surrealism and a wider cultural, social and political context. The thesis contends that developments in the illustrated press had a substantial impact on surrealist publications and that commercial photographic practices were both exploited and subverted by the group. I defend this assertion by demonstrating how photographers associated with the surrealist movement in its formative years were closely involved in the process by which the photographic image became a major means of communication. I argue that the surrealists were conscious that photography was central to the circulation of ideas and developed a radical notion of the illustration of text. The thesis examines how photographs used in surrealist publications were integrated into the complex surrealist project and how, due to the currency of images in society, the medium offered opportunities for disruption. In each of the five chapters, I examine the surrealist deployment of photographic images to articulate cultural and political radicalism. The thesis argues that the photographs published by the surrealists made an important contribution to contemporary discourse on sexuality. This thesis makes an original contribution to knowledge as it expands the understanding of photographs published by the surrealist group by exploring their relationship to contemporary commercial images circulating in the press. It analyses works that have been marginalised: many of the images in the first two journals in the inter-war period, the images in the illustrated books *1929*, *Banalité*, *Le septième face du d* and the images in the post-war journals have been neglected as subjects of study.

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
